
Clinton Applefest 2024

The Village of Clinton Zoning Department strives to work with its residents and local business owners. In the short 4 years I've been employed with the



One Planning Commission Meeting, permit approved. Nine permits issued by the Inspector, ten permits total. Seven junk or abandoned, nonregistered vehicles removed, twenty-four



total in four years. This quarter there was one high grass notice issued and the resident complied.

Besides the numbers, our department has met with several residents on site to discuss future plans for building. We have met with local businesses and future business owners to review the possibilities of bringing new business into the Village. We are very excited for the future of the Village of Clinton!

1.6 mill Fire Levy Update

We will not have the issue number for the November Fire Levy until the middle of August. We are asking for your support to pass this levy to hire a full-time paramedic and continue with equipment purchases. The new

levy will generate an equal amount (\$240,000) to what citizens are currently paying for the building and equipment levies that will disappear from our tax bills, if we get your support.

What's Your Driving Score?

A couple of years ago I wrote to you and asked, if your speedometer has a zero on it and does it show up when you stop at a stop sign. When I became a Christian I understood that I would be baptized with the Holy Spirit of God and that He would convict me of the things I do wrong in my life. I can choose to ignore that conviction, but when I do, God would put people or things in my life to make me pay attention. God used Nathan the Prophet to bring King David's sin with Bathsheba to his attention. I use that example to introduce my article about my driving score.



The older I get the more frugal (some people call it cheap) I become. I hate debt personally and for the city. But sometimes, debt is a good choice. My 2012 Toyota Prius just had the transmission go out, after I just put \$275 for brakes and \$400 for front struts into it. I purchased the car from a Skipco auction in 2016. When I bought it, the car already had 60,000 miles on it. When the transmission went out it had 205,000 miles on it. When I do the math, it cost me less than 8 cents a mile to drive it for 8 years.

Faced with an unwanted decision about what to do next for transportation, I began to explore my options to purchase a new or used car. I've only purchased one new car in my life and although I like the vehicle (1990 conversion van), I despised the five years of payments. To make a long story short and to get to the point. I purchased a new hybrid vehicle. At the end of every trip the car gives me a driving score. During my test drive my score was 59. The car tells me what the posted speed limit is while I'm driving and apparently grades me for going too fast. Another part of my score is how fast I accelerate. Pulling away too fast cost me points on my score.

The new vehicle has taught or should I say, convicted me that I need to become a better driver. That's something I knew, but I choose to ignore. They say, you canít teach an old dog new tricks. But, I am willing to try. I've always said, we are never more like Jesus then when we forgive someone and I'm never less like Jesus then when I'm behind the wheel of a car. My motivation for becoming a better driver is the difference between 50 mpg or 40 mpg. Trinka says that I went from driving like Richard Petty to driving like an old man. I say, an older and wiser man.

Next up for me, is a score for the words that come out of my mouth. After all, I will be judged for every idle word that I speak.

So many great things have happened and are happening in Canal Fulton and I give all the glory to my Lord and Savior Jesus Christ, They would not have happened without the selfless sacrifice of so many wonderful people who call Canal Fulton home and serve the city with their time and effort. It's been a few articles since I had to write about staff changes within the City of Canal Fulton, but unfortunately that streak is coming to an end. Over the summer, Finance Director Bill Rouse announced that he is planning to retire at the end of the year. Bill has been Finance Director

since 2013, excluding 2021 when he served as City Manager. I wanted to take this opportunity to thank Bill for everything he has done for the city, and everything he has done for me in helping to start my career in this position. He will be truly missed. By the time this article hits your mailbox, City Council will have selected a new Finance Director. I am confident that we will continue building on the success that Bill started.

You may have noticed several changes throughout the city this year. Additional string lights have been hung on South Canal Street, with more coming next summer as we expand our renovations on the sidewalks in our downtown. Echoing Hills new buildings are nearly complete on Locust St., which will be a welcome addition to the east side of the city. Also, the water tower is being constructed at 21 and Arcadia St. We anticipate that this project will be completed by Summer of 2025. Once the tower is operational, the city hopes that more development will soon follow in that area.

Finally, if you drive past the Schalmo Family YMCA, you will see that the Welcome to Historic Canal Fulton Mural has been hung on the side! This mural was originally hung on the fire station at the corner of Cherry and High Streets, but was removed when that building was torn down and sold. The mural sat in storage for several years as the city tried to find a new home that made sense. We tried to find a location within the Historic District, but could not find an area big enough. After several meetings with Bud Graham, who helped design the mural, we agreed to hang in on the Y. Thank you to Shawn Lazarus and his crew for hanging this mural. This mural, along with the new mural that is painted on the side of Coach House Floral, will hopefully open more opportunities for artists to come to town and paint more street art throughout the city.

What is Zoning?

Greetings, everyone! This is your local Zoning Inspector sending a quick communique your way!

Perhaps, if you are anything like I am, in your most idle moments, questions about the world pop up to which you never really had an answer. How do geese know which way south is? Why do stars twinkle? Why do we say "break a leg" when we mean "good luck"? Oh, and here is a good one: What the heck is Zoning anyway? Let's give it a shot!

Zoning laws are the regulations that dictate how land can be used within specific districts and jurisdictions. Essentially, they determine what types of activities—whether residential, commercial, industrial, or recreational—are permitted in different areas. These regulations play a crucial role in maintaining order and balance in neighborhoods by ensuring that homes, businesses, and public spaces are appropriately located. They also serve to protect property values, ease traffic congestion, and uphold public health, safety, and welfare standards.

The concept of zoning has ancient roots, with early examples seen in civilizations such as Rome. In the United States, modern zoning practices began to take shape with a resolution passed in 1916 in New York City. This resolution was a response to the rapid growth of skyscrapers and introduced specific requirements for buildings within designated districts to manage urban development effectively.

The pivotal moment for zoning in the United States came in 1926 with the Supreme Court case Village of Euclid v. Ambler Realty Co., centered in Cleveland, Ohio. This landmark case upheld the constitutionality of zoning laws, affirming the practice of regulating land use through separate districts. This approach, now commonly known as Euclidean Zoning, continues to shape zoning practices both domestically and internationally. Its legacy guides communities in sustainable development practices and the preservation of a high quality of life for residents.



I feel proud of our team and their daily efforts to provide our community with the highest quality of services.

My vision for the future includes continual growth and alignment of services to businesses, residents, and visitors in Canal Fulton and Lawrence Township, as well as enhancing our readiness to respond to emergencies in this growing community.

Managing change is one of the most significant challenges that every organization faces. In our community, the fire service dynamics changed with the end of the volunteer model in the early 2000s. In recent years, we have been dealing with a shortage of part-time firefighters and high turnover while the number of career departments hiring full-time firefighters is rising. The longevity of part-time firefighters has now been reduced to months instead of years. Therefore, we will continue to monitor and explore opportunities to enhance our current staffing model. The officers and firefighters of the CFFD and LTFD are our organization's most valuable assets. I want to thank them for their professionalism and unwavering commitment at every level of service. I also appreciate their continued hard work, dedication to training, and vigilance in ensuring the safety of Lawrence Township and Canal Fulton residents.

DEPARTMENT COSTS CONTINUE TO INCREASE

Fire department trucks have been increasing in price yearly due to several factors, including inflation, new regulations, and supply chain issues. Some say that the price of a new fire truck could increase by 10-35%, while others estimate that trucks could cost up to \$100,000 more due to new emissions standards in 2026.

In 2011, the cost of firefighter protective clothing was approximately \$2,000 - \$2,500 per firefighter. Current 2024 costs are \$4,500-\$5,000, and it has to be replaced every 10 years.

Paramedic certification/education cost \$2,700 in 2004. Today, our members spend over \$6,000.

Fire Department Services



How is the fire department staffed? We strive to staff four (4) part-time EMTs 24/7.

How many full-time members do you have? We only have one (1) full-time member responsible for fire inspections and administrative duties.

What services does the Fire Department provide? Canal Fulton and Lawrence Township operate an all-hazards emergency response fire department. The department's primary functions include fire suppression, emergency medical response, hazardous materials response, fire prevention, and education. Department members respond to significant events such as ice storms, snowstorms, major electrical outages, floods, and other emergencies in the community. Their involvement extends beyond emergency response to programs such as child passenger safety restraint installations, babysitting classes, smoke alarm installations, CPR and defibrillator training, and fire extinguisher training.



POLICE DEPT.

This year a few of our officers received awards for their hard work and dedication to the Township. **Officer Chad Rohr** was voted by his peers as the 2023 Officer of the Year. Chad has been with the Township for 2 years and quicky became a well-rounded officer. He comes to work each day with a positive attitude and the desire to keep our community

safe. Officer Taylor Patterson was given the 2023 Drug Officer of the Year. Officer Patterson had more than 30 drug cases, ranging from minor possession to cases where she found a suitcase full of multiple types of drugs and a firearm. There were not many weeks where she had some type of drug arrest. We added a drug dog to the department last year, who was assigned to Officer Patterson to help in the detection of illegal drugs. Officer Scott Jones was given the Chief's Award. Officer Jones spends many hours doing some administrative tasks in addition to his patrol work, which helps keep the department running smoothly. His willingness to help whenever possible was much appreciated by me and our other supervisors. Congratulations to these officers for a great 2023. I hope 2024 is as successful for all of you.



On the November ballot you will see a replacement levy for the Police Department. This levy is a continuous levy that was approved by the voters in 1990. The levy has remained the same since. The levy request will keep the millage the same but replace it with current valuations. The request by the Township to have this levy replaced is to help cover the costs of the Police Department. We currently run on 5 levies, 3 are continuous and 2 are 5-year levies. This is a 1.5 mill levy, which costs \$35 per \$100,000 of value a year. This is not a new levy or a new tax, but it will generate additional money.

Where did summer go? It is hard to believe fall is here and winter will be along soon. Here are a few things to keep in mind during these fall and winter months.

MAILBOX SAVVY: In January 1999, Township Resolution 99-044 was passed acknowledging the Township would assume the responsibility of replacing only those mailboxes physically knocked down by the road crew during the snow removal process. The Township will not be responsible for mailboxes that are down due to the weight of the snow or deterioration. This is a good time to replace rotten and weak mailbox posts. Use good quality screws instead of nails when attaching the mailbox to the post.



LEAF PICKUP: There will be no leaf pickup in the Township this fall.

CHRISTMAS TREE PICKUP: There will be no Christmas tree pickup in the Township this winter.

BASKETBALL HOOPS: Please remove basketball hoops from the culde-sacs and roads during the winter months. If these are not removed, it will make it difficult to salt and plow effectively.

PLOWING: When the snow starts flying and bad weather arrives, please remember that we concentrate on plowing the main roads first and then we plow the allotments. Please have patience as we will be sure to get to you.

TOWNSHIP PARK

One of the major accomplishments this year is to the Lawrence Township Park. The completion of the restrooms, pickleball courts, basketball court and concession stand were wonderful additions to our park. The Township applied for and received a grant to install lighting for both courts, and we are anticipating this project to be completed by the end of this year or the first quarter of next year, 2025. (All good stuff!)

NOVEMBER LEVY

Now, let's talk about the necessary evil that none of us like, tax levies. You will see a new levy on the ballot in November for the Road Department. Even though it will be listed as a new levy, this is a levy that three years ago was overlooked and not placed on the ballot. The Road Department lost the funding from that levy, so your taxes went down by the amount of this levy. It was the major potion for the Township for road maintenance used for ditching projects, snow plowing and ice control. Several cuts have been made since the loss of the funds such as road stripping, road resurfacing, fall leaf pickup and Christmas tree pickup. This year was the first time in three years that any road surfacing has been completed. The Township was only able to complete 1/3 of its road resurfacing project compared to what it has previously done in past years due to the failed levy. So please, remember to vote on November 5th. 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

Joan Porter, Congratulations on Your Retirement By Trustee Doug Swartz

I would like to take this time to celebrate a very special person who many of you may not have seen or known much about, but who has contributed immensely to our communities for over three decades. Joan Porter has announced her retirement as a freelance journalist for the Canton Repository and the Massillon Independent after over 40 years of outstanding journalism.

Joan has kept our communities informed with up-todate news by attending literally thousands of community meetings in Lawrence Township, Canal Fulton, and our local Northwest School Board, which we have read about in the paper. Her dedication and hard work have not gone unnoticed, and I felt compelled to finally put her in the spotlight.

One of the things that I admired most about Joan was her attention to detail. On numerous occasions, I would attend the same meetings and then read her articles the next day, learning something new that I hadn't picked up on during the meeting. Her handwritten notetaking and reporting style have been truly amazing to so many, and I consider her a pillar of local journalism.

A little about Joan: her journey into journalism was somewhat unconventional. "I have a degree in secondary education with majors in both English and German," Joan told me in a telephone interview. "After a year of teaching, I realized I wasn't cut out for it." Her path took a turn when she began attending trustee meetings in Michigan and writing letters to the editor of the Adrian Telegram. Apparently, these letters showcased her sharp writing skills, leading to an unexpected offer to become a full-time journalist. Joan then moved to the Stark County area where she "took out my poison pen and began writing letters to the editor once again." I found it fascinating that she has never applied anywhere or taken formal training to be a journalist. Her strength in written communication, honed during her high school and college years, has

shone through in her letters and led to gainful employment. Joan was soon writing in Stark County, first for the Signal and the Canal Courier, and later for the Suburbanite, Akron Beacon Journal, Massillon Independent, and Canton Repository.

Through my personal experience, Joan's approach to journalism has always been grounded in integrity and objectivity, and I don't think I am alone in that respect. Mike McNeely, former Canal Fulton Police Chief, praised her, saying, "Joan Porter is an honest and ethical journalist who served our Canal Fulton and Lawrence communities for many years. As a newly appointed police chief in the early 90s, I sincerely appreciated her approach to reporting the news."

The current Mayor of Canal Fulton, Joseph Schultz, echoed these sentiments: "Joan Porter always showed up to work to keep our community well informed about what their local government was doing in the most objective and ethical manner. She is a true journalist. She will be greatly missed by members of our government and residents of our community."

I enjoyed her walking me through her career and the significant changes she recounted in the journalism industry. From typing her copy on a manual typewriter to navigating the complexities of the CRT (Cathode-Ray Tube) Terminal typewriter, she has adapted and thrived over the many changes. I am going to be honest; I am not sure I even know what a CRT is–probably equivalent to what the rotary phone is today to our younger audience.

Online digital content is especially interesting to her. "People get their news from Facebook, and it's not always a reliable source," she told me. She is concerned that the poster often colors their content with their own opinions. That is something she took pride in during her career–her objectivity. So much so, that she took painstaking steps not to engage with local officials that she admired in her career so that she

could remain objective in her reporting.

News aggregators were a source of frustration for her as technology advanced. "They often lifted stories and published them without compensating for the content." In her mind, this was theft of intellectual property.

Yet, despite these frustrations, Joan seemed to have a positive outlook on the future of journalism and sees the potential in new technologies, although she remains cautious about the introduction of Al into journalism.

What she enjoyed most was learning something new every day as well as doing some featured stories on people. Government stories were always "cut and dry," she told me. "However, when doing a feature on a person you have much more latitude in what you can write." She really enjoyed promoting good people, and in return, we hope to do the same here with this article for her.

Lastly, Joan seemed proud to talk about her wonderful husband and children, details that she kept from people to help her maintain her impartiality during her career. She and her husband Norm have two wonderful kids. Jim is living in Los Angeles and works as a software engineer. She was proud to report that he makes 3D-printed rockets that help put satellites in space. Katy owns and operates Kitchen Bakery, a farm-to-table artisan bakery in Marysville, Ohio. Joan, thank you for the interview and the many years of unwavering commitment to objective reporting you have provided to our community. It goes without saying, you will be sorely missed, and our community is at a great loss upon your retirement. 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
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YOUR ROADS YOUR CHOICE TAX OR INVESTMENT?

WHAT IS ON THE BALLOT?

Nov. 5th there will be a 1.75 mil road levy on the ballot for Lawrence Township residents.



This will cost homeowners \$61 per year per \$100,000 of property tax valuation.

The proceeds from this levy can only be used exclusively by the road department for materials and labor used on township roadways.

WHY DO WE NEED THIS MONEY?

57 MILES OF ROADWAY RELIES SOLELY ON THE TOWNSHIP FOR CARE AND MAINTENANCE

- Township roads are chip seal which require regular repair and resurfacing.
- Prior to resurfacing, pot holes and berms need to be repaired so the final product is a smooth road.
- Winter in Ohio requires us to be prepared for snow and ice and have adequate staffing to respond during storms.
- Prices have increased substantially and our ongoing budget does not allow us to perform the repairs and other services outlined here.
- Forgoing maintenance and staffing cuts will hurt our township and cost more in the long run.

WHAT IS CHIP SEAL AND WHY DO WE NEED IT?

Chip sealing is a widely-used preventative maintenance treatment that extends the need to perform a traditional asphalt resurfacing by five to seven years. Chip seal also reduces the need to seal cracks and provides more skid resistance.

WHY WE CHIP SEAL

- PAVEMENT CONDITIONS: Chip seals are done while roads are in adequate conditions, before oxidation causes more extensive breakage and pot holes.
- COST SAVINGS: Chip seals cost one-fourth to one-fifth the cost of asphalt resurfacing.
- PAVEMENT LIFESPAN: Chip seals extend pavement life by five to seven years before a full resurfacing.
- REDUCED MAINTENANCE: Chip sealed roads typically do not need crack sealed.
- SAFETY: Chip seals provide good skid resistance.

- Our current cost to resurface with chip seal is \$30,395.22 per mile!
- We need to do 10-12 miles per year to maintain the life of our roads. That is \$364,742.64 in resurfacing alone!
- Even with modest cuts to services our current budget allows for approximately half that amount.
- This will result in deteriorating roads which will require more repairs which will cost more in the long run and require further cuts to other services.
- Each plow route in the winter takes 5 hours, approx. 3 to salt only. Further cuts would significantly increase this time and risk to peoples' health and property.
- If you are unsure or want more information on why we need this levy, our budget, or services provided, I strongly encourage you to reach out to myself (Keith) or the township office. We care about our township and we want you to be well informed on Nov. 5th!

WHY IS THIS A "NEW" LEVY?

Prior to 2022 our road district was funded by two tax levies, one of which expired. Because it expired, a "new" levy must be passed to replace the one that expired in 2021.

The road district lost \$348,000 /year in 2022, 2023, and 2024 based on a 1.4 mil replacement levy.

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
